### Day 1: Casablanca

Arrive into Casablanca international airport early afternoon, where you'll be met by our local driver for transfer to the hotel. Take time to relax at the hotel before our welcome dinner tonight. (B, D)

### Day 2: Rabat

Before leaving Casablanca, we'll visit the spectacular Hassan II Mosque, overlooking the Atlantic Ocean. This is one of the largest mosques in the world and the only functioning mosque in Morocco open to non-Muslims.





It's just over an hour's drive to Rabat, the capital of Morocco. We'll visit the Kasbah of the Udayas, with its and Andalusian Garden, and other key sights, including the Hassan II tower and Mohamed V Mausoleum. (B)

#### Day 3: Chefchaouen

From Rabat, we drive through the Rif Mountains to Chefchaouen, 'the Blue Pearl', famous for its beautiful, blue-painted buildings in the medina. It's a small, friendly town, easy to explore: the perfect place to wander the pretty streets of the medina. (B)

#### Day 4: Chefchaouen

A free day in Chefchaouen to explore the cafes and shops of Chefchaouen medina, Place el Haouta, the main square, the kasbah and several viewpoints above the town. This evening, before dinner, there is an optional 30-minute walk to the Spanish mosque outside Chefchaouen to watch sunset over the town. (B)

Day 5: Volubilis, Fes



Morocco was at the outer edge of the Roman Empire and today, on our drive south to Fes, we'll visit the Roman city of Volubilis, where a local guide will explain the history of the Romans in Morocco and bring to life the ancient ruins and wonderful mosaics. We'll have lunch nearby before continuing to Fes, our home for the next three nights. (B, D) o/n Fes

#### Day 6: Fes

Fes is synonymous with ceramics and leather, so we start the day with a visit to a ceramics workshop and the famous Chouara tanneries, which are quite a sight (and smell!). Then a guided walking tour of the medina, with its labyrinth of lanes and alleyways, the Blue Gate, a secret tea shop, stunning architecture and, of course, the souks, jampacked with anything you might want to buy. #### Day 7: Fes

Enjoy a free day in Fes – there are lots of options today: learn how to prepare a classic Moroccan meal in a cooking class; have a hamman (traditional Moroccan spa); visit a local artist or do a photography walk with a street photographer (activities subject to availability and at extra cost); go shopping in the many souks, wander in the medina where there is something new around every corner or take time to relax at the riad. ### Day 8: Erfoud

South towards the Sahara! We have a long drive today but with stops along the way, including a goat's cheese farm tour and tasting and tea with the Berber owner of a traditional cave house. Passing through Ifrane, known as the Switzerland of Morocco, we'll look out for the barbary apes that live in the nearby cedar forests.



Forested hills gradually give way to an arid, more barren landscape before we reach today's destination - the oasis town of Erfoud, famous for its date palms and the many fossils found in this area. Our overnight stop before the desert. (B) o/n Erfoud

### Day 9: Merzouga and Sahara

Today we visit Rissani, known for its authentic spice market. After trying the local speciality of 'Berber pizza' for lunch, we'll meet our camels on the edge of the dunes for the transfer to the desert camp. Or, if you prefer, you can go in a 4x4. And, in case you're wondering, the desert camp tents have aircon and en suite bathrooms.

#### Day 10: Dades Gorge

The early risers this morning can watch the sunrise over the vast expanse of Erg Chebbi, the 'Sea of Dunes'.



Back to Merzouga by camel or 4x4, to meet our transport for the drive along the 'Road of a Thousand Kasbahs.' We'll stop near Jorf to see some centuries-old irrigation systems and in Tinghir to visit a Berber weaving co-operative before continuing to Boumalne Dades.



Then we're in Dades Gorge, with spectacular views at every turn. Our hotel for the next two nights is in the gorge. (B, D) o/n Dades Gorge

#### Day 11: Dades Gorge

We'll spend today in Dades Gorge, visiting the famous switchback road and walking in the gardens. It may be possible to do a breadmaking workshop in a local home in the gorge (small extra cost).(B, D)

#### Day 12: Ait Benhaddou

Our destination today is Ait Benhaddou, an 11<sup>th</sup> century ksar (fortified village), UNESCO World Heritage Site and filming location for many famous movies, including Gladiator and Games of Thrones. We'll spend the afternoon exploring the kasbah, with its cute shops, art studios and cafes and a viewpoint at the top, overlooking the valley and mountains beyond. (B)

#### Day 13: Marrakech

After breakfast this morning, we have a scenic drive over the High Atlas Mountains to the 'red city' of Marrakech. The rest of the afternoon is free to explore. This evening, a visit to the main square, Jemaa el Fnaa, is a must, with snake charmers, entertainers and musicians - it truly comes alive after dusk (B).

Back in the medina, the afternoon is free before we meet again this evening, for a 'Ten Tastings of Marrakech' food tour with a local Marrakechi guide. It's a fun and informative evening that takes care of dinner. (B, D)

Today is a free day in Marrakech. You may want to do an early-morning hot-air balloon ride, go shopping or perhaps visit some of the city's landmarks, including the Bahia Palace, Sadian Tombs or Ben Youssef Madrasa. (B)

We'll stop on the way to visit an argan oil co-operative, arriving in Essaouira in time for lunch.
